



Talk of spending the thousands of dollars to find the North Pole ; if half the money spent in that way was offered as a reward for the detection of the man who invented shirts that buttoned in the back, and he could be turned loose among men who have suffered for years by his devilish contrivance, it would be well expended. For 14 years the men of this country have been slaves to this absurd fashion, and more arms have been cramped, shoulders dislocated, and backs bent than would be believed by those who have not seen it.
