



Mr. Maxwell commenced the survey on 10th September last. He started from the Intercolonial between the bridges on which that line crosses the Northwest and Southwest Miramichi

rivers and ran by the best available route through the Parish of Derby and in Blackville as far as a point just be-

yond the mouth of Bartholomew River. The route followed was, in many places

identical with that of the trial survey made in 1875 by the late Mr. Buck, with some important changes, particularly near and at Indiantown and Renous rivers. This is known as the Northern route, which is the longest and most difficult, being  $21\frac{1}{4}$  miles in length from the junction with the In-

> tercolonial to Bartholomew River, bevond which there is no difference of opinion as to route.

The route by the south side was next surveyed, starting from Chatham Junction and running through portions Every Monday, Wednesday and of the parishes of Nelson and Blackville to Bartholomew river. The distance by this route is  $19\frac{1}{4}$  miles, the gradients easier, quantities lighter and


