Storing Geraniums.

Vick says :- Geraniums that are to merely kept over for another season may be allowed to remain out as long as the weather will permit, and sometimes this is quite late, Last fall, our plants remained uninjured until the first of November, or a little later, but that was quite unusual. By watching the temperature, erable use Hop Bitters at once. It may and giving the plants protection when cold threatens, they may be allowed to remain some time after frost has arrived. However, when a severe freeze is imminent the plants should be lifted and taken in. Strong plants that have made considerable root-growth may be kept over very well by tying them three or four in a bundle and hanging them up in a cellar, where they will be secure from frost through the winter, and where there is sufficient moisture in the atmosphere to prevent drying out. A cellar containing a furnace, keeping the air constantly dry, is not suitable, and even one with a ce ment bottom is less desirable than one with soil or gravel bottom. Small plants, and all those varieties that have a small root-growth, such as all those with variegated foliage, do not keep well by this method as they dry out. Except for those that are very strong we advise placing the plants in boxes of soil in the cellar and allowing only sufficient moisture to prevent drying out.
