Probable Loss of the "Hittero."

A sad tale of shipwreck comes from Meat Cove, Cape Breton, which is at the North end of the Island on the West side. On the night of the 14th, inst. a lumberladen vessel was driven against the cliffs there and went to pieces, every soul on board perishing. The wreckage was discovered next day and the news sent to the press by the telegraph operator stationed there. Private and press enquiries have elicited the following facts. The vessel was, apparently, an old one with some new top work; the bowsprit white; a mast found was of oak or teak; some of the wreckage was painted red; the deals, a large proportion of which were seven inches wide (none we found under that width) were marked "J. B. S." on the ends; some women's clothing was found in the wreckage; some of the vessel's planking was green-painted; several of the vessel's yards were pine and had iron bands on the ends with pieces of chain attached; a man's shirt with the letters, "E. D." was among the wreckage. The

latest despatch is as follows,-North Sydney, iv. 20. The operator at Meat Cove reports this p. m. that he had just returned from the scene of the wrecked timber ship previously reported. He found the sunken remains of the hull in about fifteen feet of water and about as many feet from the shore. At Sailor's Brook, two and a half miles west of Cape St. Lawrence, he saw two dead bodies and a lot of rigging, sails, chains, etc. The bodies were apparently without any clothing.
