boat subsidy. We (for there are hundreds of us in this City,) who have made the venture, do not abate our love for the old home, or our respect for the Crown, but we cannot hide from ourselves the fact that the genius of American institutions, coupled with the opportunities and conditions offered, more than compensate for all we have left behind. The Herald of this city, in an article on Education, says that "the yearly influx of illiterate immigrants from Canada, makes the question of Compulsory Education of great moment," These people come here to try their fortunes, and the Labor Bureau, which has investigated this matter, says that of 90,000 illiterates in this state, "the

great majority are Canadian French." Now, it would not be possible to gather together an equal number of persons who have grown up here, who would be so literate. Do you suppose we are so blind as not to see that this land has advantages not enjoyed by us when we were boys at home? If we find better opportunities here, and better prospects for our children, must we refuse to accept them out of loyalty to the B. C.? Not if we must bow to the B. C. after our love for our native land has departed. I suppose a man has a natural right to better his condition, and is not to be deterred from so doing because the Advocate fears he will waver in his loyalty if he does I do not know that the soil and climate of Massachusetts are any more favorable to human happiness than those of New Brunswick; if therefore we find ourselves in a better condition here, is it too much to suggest that New Brunswick may pro fit by the methods that have made Mas-




