

If we except the long terms of Pitt and Liverpool, no Premier has held office continuously for seven years, and only three have reached a longer term than six years. Mr. Gladstone's second term of power has already exceeded the average duration and the frequent changes of administration in the hundred years past all tend to show how exceedingly problematical are the chances of any leader in his position, however great, prolonging his reign much farther. - Telegraph.
