The Regatta.

The postponed fourth annual Miramichi Regatta took place at Bushville on Thursday last week. The early morning was a fair one, with a light S.W. wind, and falling barometer and rain began to fall about the time the first race was started.

The first race started was the Indian Canoes. It was a half mile, and was won as follows:—Julian Chief, 10 min. 17 sec., Kewawayin, 10 min. 34 sec., Flying Cloud distanced.

The next race was for sail boats of 24 ft. keel and under. There were three starters, the James and Kilbride of Millerton and the Arrow of Chatham.

The James was sailed by Mr. James Miller, the Kilbride by Mr. John C. Miller and the Arrow by Mr. Charlie Johnson, for the owner, Mr. Geo. Watt.

The second class sailing race was next started. This was for boats of 18 ft. keel and under. The starters were,—Annie, Chatham.

The four-oared race was contested by two crews as follows.—The J. C. Miller, (Derby Crew) Wm. Bryenton, Peter G. Henderson, Geo. Parker and Wm. Parker.

The Minnehaha (Nelson) manned by John Richardson and John Mather of Nelson and Nagle and Vail of St. John. The course was 2-mile one and the Derby men won easily in 11 min. 08 sec., the time of the other being 12 min. 13 sec.

The Derby men were in splendid form and rowed well together, while the Minnehaha's crew pulled under the disadvantages of never having sat in their boat together until they went into it to row the race.

The Pub Race was decided as follows, Telephone Thibodeau 1st, Sam'l Kingston 2nd, Patrick Murphy 3rd and Andrew McBride 4th.

It is probable that the next annual Regatta will be held at either Chatham or Newcastle, as popular desire is decidedly in that direction.

THE HANLAN-BEACH RACE. "A Press despatch, referring to the late Hanlan-Beach race in Australia, says,—The day following the recent race a large meeting was held in Sydney. Hanlan then admitted he had purposely fouled Beach because he believed the latter had willful crossed over into his water. Hanlan said he was willing to row another match in three months; Beach refused in less than six months. The captain of the steamer "Tonks," present at the meeting, stated he was compelled to close upon Hanlan's boat to avoid running aground. It was generally believed another match between Hanlan and Beach would be arranged. Betting already stood in anticipation of the event 3 to 1 on Hanlan, with 4 to 1 wanted. The Australian papers, speaking of Hanlan, say his visit has done much to promote rowing; that many of the best scullers learned much from his good example and skill, and that no one could be more courteous or willing to instruct than the world-renowned champion. Beach's splendid appearance was commented on; he is an Englishman by birth, twenty-six years old, six feet high, and went to Australia when a child. He is generally acknowledged to be the finest oarsman Australia has ever produced."
