SIR. -I wish to call attention to the paragraph in your last week's edition under the head of "scandalous," in which you refer to the "inefficiency" of the fishery officers along the South West River. Your statement is a rash generalization and covers a "multitude" of injustice. I know not the source of your information nor the responsibility of your informant, but the statement is so contrary to the facts that it could only have been inspired by malice or ignorance. As regards "inefficiency" you do not particularize any locality, but deal in misrepresentation on the wholesale. My district extends from the upper end of Beaubear's Island to the lower line of Blackville, including the Renous River and its branches, and as to the conduct of the affairs of my office over that territory and during my appointment I refer you to my returns to the Inspector of Fisheries. which is the only answer I can make, and I feel sure will silence all adverse criticism.
