County, and as it must be apparent that neither the Chief Inspector nor the Board have any discretion in postponing or dallying with the now existing absolute positive requirements of the Acts (prohibitory or otherwise) and that this notification is no part of our duty, but is on the very verge of prudential discretion, they trust that all will accept the inevitable with the best grace possible, and that operate with and assist the Chief Inspector in putting an end to the present disgrace ful state of things. For though different regard to the policy of the Scott Act, so called, there ought to be no two opinions on this-that whilst it is the law of the land it should be loyally carried out and that that period is a very dangerous one. when individuals or citizens can determine with impunity what existing law they will observe, and what they will disregard. The result of such a course would be

simply to overturn the foundations of society and lead to utter confusion. On which account they venture to appeal, in the first instance, to the good sense and good feeling of the community.

Extensive Fire at Charlottetown

A fire broke out at Charlottetown. P. E. I., on Wednesday morning of last week, and destroyed nearly all the south side of Queen's square. Newson's furniture establishment, the Patrtot printing offices, the Cameron block, Brown's shops, Henry Beer's shops, and Heartz's building were totally destroyed.

The Post Office, from the roof of which the Dominion Government caused the slates to be stripped a couple of years ago and for which they substituted unpainted wooden shingles, caught fire in the roof, and was completely destroyed. Besides the Post Office, the Savings Bank, Customs, and other Dominion offices were in this building.

The following persons had their places of business destroyed, in most cases with heavy loss:- Jno. Newson, furniture manufacturer; the Patriot printing offices, Power's barber shop, Wakefield, billiard room; Fraser and Reddin, druggists: Mclean and Martin, barristers; Warbur. ton and Conroy, barristers; McLeod and Morrison, barristers; Kennedy, confectioner; Desbrisay and Angus, insurance agents; Nelmes, book store; Taylor. jeweller; Haszard, stationer and printer W. & A. Brown, dry goods ; Henry Beer hardware, and others. The fire was caused by the upsetting of a lamp in Kenned's confectionery. Joseph Weeks, an old man, dropped dead in the excitement.
