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

Formerly the Dominion Government ad- No. vanced the subsidies at 41 per cent., but this year had refused them and so necessitated a loan from the banks. The grant would cover interest on the sum already borrowed and on money that will be required until the Government were enabled

to get the subsidy or float debentures. Hon. Mr. Blair said that when at Ottawa he had explained to the Finance Minister that it had been the intention of the Government to bond the floating debt, but that, owing to a clause in the law, it could not be satisfactorily done; and he asked in a spirit of fairness that the Dominion Government should do as formerly. A formal request was afterward forwarded, but no favorable answer had been received. The administration were therefore compelled to borrow money to meet current demands and when it was not obtainable from the Dominion it had to be got elsewhere.

Mr. Adams claimed that the Government had borrowed during the year \$466, 900; out of this \$119,000 was paid for 12 From Quatawamkedgwick Parliament buildings, \$13,723 on suspense account, and \$150,000 temporary loan, leaving a balance to the credit of the Province of \$25,000. It was easy for any Government, he said, to come down with money if they could succeed in borrowing. On October 31st, 1882, the total floating indebtedness, according to the late Provincial Secretary, was \$265,000; on Dec. 31st, 1882, the administration came in with \$55,000 of a balance, and now they have only \$25,000.
