> Floods in the U.S. The Ohio river has again submerged vast tracts of land, villages, and portions of cities on its banks. A despatch of Monday last says,-

ing, W. Va., only reveals the extent of

its ravages. Hundreds of houses and

barns are gathered at points where the

surface of the water was obstructed by trees. The Baltimore & Ohio track is covered with buildings and drift wood, which had to be pulled away to pass engines to the clear road. There has been no mail since Wednesday. Few trains are moving. There are probably 20,000 persons to be fed and clothed from Wellsburg to Moundsville. The Ohio River railway is believed to be entirely ruined, sections of the trestle work, bridges and cars having been washed away. The damage to property is estimated at six million dollars. The entire fire department is engaged washing mul dep sits from the streets. Not a vestige is left of Cochinville, Munroe County, an Ohio village. The ice in Cenodaquinet Creek, Harrisburg, Pa., broke on Saturday, causing a tremendous flood. Four bridges valued at \$80,000 were carried away and mills along the stream were seriously damaged. The flood is the worst ever seen Cumberland Valley. At Aurora, Ind., Sunday, the water was still rising and was 100 at the doors of the Aurora National Bank. Only one drug store remains out of water. The Ohio was still rising on Saturday. Mill Creek valley is submerged. The damage to coal and lumber yards, vegetatable gardens &c., is incalculable. At Cincinnati the flood of 1882 was surpassed. The river was rising almost constantly all Sunday. The gas company managed to keep the gas supply up until Sunday night, but then the street lamps were unlighted and gas was barning in very few places. Theatres are running with electric and calcium lights and private gas machines. A Galliopolis despatch says: The water is seven feet above the highest point reached


