Almost on the first day, in 1858, that the first message was sent over the first cable the wire was broken. Of the cables laid by the Anglo-American Company that laid in 1865 was broken on March 11, 1873, and finally abandoned February 1, 1878: that laid in 1866 was broken on January 13, 1877, and that laid in 1873 was broken April 2, 1879, but was repaired in the same year. The first section of the cable of the "Direct" Company, which was laid in 1874, has been broken three times. On the second section, as it is called, of this cable, from Torbay to Rye Beach, there have been fully twenty breakages. The
