

IN ANSWER TO THIS the defendants said that their constitution and bye laws required candidates for ini tiation to be in sound health, which the plaintiff knew, yet knowing he was not in a healthy condition, he, by fraudulent misrepresentations and concealment in regard thereto, procured his initiation, They denied that the plaintiff was, during his initiation, violently thrown by any o the defendants' officers or members duly authorized, in such a manner as to cause the injuries complained of, and asserted that any injuries that may have been sustained by him during his initiation were not caused by the defendants, or by any one acting under their authority.

The plaintiff appeared in Court with crutches, which, however, appeared to be of little use in enabling him to move about, owing, as he himself stated, and as his medical witness also deposed, to the weakness of his spine consequent on the injuries he complained of.
