An agitation is on foot in New Brunswick to secure the removal or the reduc tion of the stumpage charged by the Provincial Government on all logs cut on the public lands. The logs sawn in that Province are almost entirely spruce, there being little pine of any value. The wood exports are, therefore, almost exclusively of spruce deals and boards and scantling. which find sale in Great Britain. Here they come in competition with the woods of Norway and Sweden and Russia. The Norway woods have the advantage of a shorter sea voyage, consequently cheaper freight, than the New Brunswick deals and the cost of the labor employed in logging and milling is less. Under these circumstances the profitable production of spruce lumber in New Brunswick is carried on with difficulty. Not long ago, the New Brunswick Government increased the rate of stumpage.
