The process of ensilage has been going through a state of evolution, gradually mproving and perfecting itself through nore complete experience. The first stage was to take whole cornstalks, place them in a trench and cover them with a heap of earth. This was not satisfactory on account of the rough and wasteful process, and soon gave way to the use of permanent stone or brick silos instead of ordinary trenches. Then stone was used instead earth for covering and in time the fodder was cut in small slices and so pressed down into the silo. In course of time as the chemical nature of the process was elected members. Small-Pox At River Du Loup. RIVER DU LOUP, Oct. 19 .- The barquenine Venice, Captain Hill, arrived here from Montreal, on Saturday with sickness on board. It appears that when the vessel cleared at Montreal, some four or five days ago, the captain engaged one seaman who took sick shortly after leaving port. The captain put into this port to get medical aid. The doctor pronounced it a bad case of small-pox and the health authorities have refused to comply with the captain's request to land the sick seaman and proceed on his voyage. 
