



> Dissolution? Is there ..

(Ottawa Cor. Montreal Star, March 10.)

The Government's organ in this city, the Citizen, waxes indignant over a statement copied from The Star by an Upper Canadian paper that the French members believe that a dissolution is to take place next Summer. The Citizen says savagely that there is not any such rumor and that if there was, it would not be correct. The denial is worth what a denial from a minthan nothing. About the rumor itself, there is no doubt as to its existence. There is scarcely a wide-awake man the press gallery who has not heard whispered around more than once during the present session, but few put any stock in it until a government organ chose to deny it. That, judging from the events preceding the dissolution of 1882, is some what in its favor. Government organs never waste time in contradicting mere rumors, but if a thing gets out prematurely, they all denounce it as talse until the time comes for unmasking, This has happened repeatedly before now, and may happen again. One thing is plain, if Sir John really be contemplating a dissolution, he wants to keep the Liberals in blissful ignorance of the fact and eatch them napping. The story, as I heard it, fully four weeks ago, from a pretty reliable source, was that the queation had been discussed by the Cabinet. If trade should improve or if anything should happen in favor of the Conservatives. Tupper was to become recognized as Sir John's chief lieutenant, and if things ran smoothly the Premier was to retire and give the Nova Scotia man the helm. This sounds like an improbable tale, but the "old man," as everybody knows is fond of surprise parties. If he really meditates such a course he will probably wait and see how the country will look on the coming measure for the relief of the C. P. R., before he

The Campbellton Bridge.

In the legislature on Saturday 14th

Mr. LaBillois moved for correspondence

relative to Bridge at Campellton across

the Restigouche. Its object was to influence legislation at Ottawa as to the proposed railway in Gaspe. The proposed railway would be injurious to Campbellton and no benfit to Gaspy. The Company had a subsidy of 10,000 acres of land and \$3,200 a mile by the Dominion. Subsequently \$300,000 were granted by the Dominion to build twenty miles of the road, including fourteen miles which the Campbellton people did not wish to see built. He read the resolutions of a public meeting at Campbellton to the effect that no railway should be built from Mission Point to Metapedia, but that connection should be made by a bridge across the Restigouche to Camp. bellton. Every legitimate influence had been used to lead the people of Gaspe to assent to the change. He had held meetings in Gaspe on the subject and showed them that the proposed connec. tion with Campbellton would bring them twenty-eight miles nearer to St. John and Halifax and give them a better local market. He also went to Ottawa and was told that the difficulty was to alter the legislation in Quebec. Tenders were called for the 20 miles of road. The people of Campbellton felt their interests were about to be sacrificed but the lowest tender was \$100,000 more than all the subsidies, estimating the land at 60 cents an acre. The building of the road was therefore postponed. These facts showed that the view of the Campbellton people were correct, as the bridge over the Restigouche would cost less than the 14 miles of road. St. John and Halifax had a large trade from the section and it could be greatly developed if the proposed bridge was built. He hoped the government would give a subsidy to the bridge as it was of provincial importance. The fisheries of Gaspe were worth \$2,500,000 a year and the trade could be vastly increased. He read from the census to show the extent of the business which would be served by the proposed connection. He showed that the assistance promised for the fourteen miles of the road was equal to \$330,800; add to this \$25,000 subsidy promised by Campbellton to the bridge, gives \$455,800, or only \$44,200 less than the Dominion Government estimate of the cost of the bridge. The
