COLLISION.—As the bk. Wm. Gordon was being towed out into the stream from Kerr's mill wharf on Monday afternoon by the S. S. Andrew she collided with the bk. Bessie Markham. The Gordon's mizzen mast was broken at the sparker boom and also at the deck, the mizzen topmast also broken, the pilot-house wrecked and several timber heads broken, etc. The other vessel was also slightly damaged. The accident was caused by an unfortunate miscalculation of the tide's effect on the part of the pilot, Mr. Geo. Sutton, who is generally a very careful and efficient man. The Wm. Gordon will be detained considerably by the mishap. We understand that Geo. M. Wood, Esq., who owns both vessels, has been very considerate in the pilot's case, for which everybody will give him credit.

THE SALVATIONISTS, so called, Messrs. Meikle and Gerrier, who have been holding a series of religious meetings in Newcastle for the past three weeks have pitched their large tent at Ritchie's Wharf, Chatham, where they held their first meeting last night. It was their intention to make a commencement on Tuesday evening, but it was necessary to make some alterations in a section of their tent, which occupied a longer time than they anticipated. They come to Chatham we are informed on the invitation of the Presbyterian and Methodist clergymen of the town. Their meetings are said to be entirely un denominational in character, the purpose being to assist—by special effort—in directing the attention of the people to their duties as Christians, leaving them to form such church alliances as they please. Their work in Newcastle is reported upon favorably.

THE SILVER Jubilee.—Speaking in the Cathedral at Mass, yesterday, His Lordship Bishop Sweeney referred to the great demonstration on Thursday evening, and expressed his thanks to the societies and to all who had participated in the procession for their manifestation of regard. At High Mass, the Right Rev. Dr. Rogers, Bishop of Chatham, occupied the pulpit, and preached an admirable sermon, taking for his text the gospel of the day—the parable of the unjust steward. In closing, His Lordship paid an eloquent tribute to the Bishop of St. John, speaking not for himself alone but for all the visiting archbishops and bishops. He spoke very feelingly, and touched the hearts of the congregation, when he dwelt upon the modesty, wisdom, zeal, energy, devotion and self-sacrificing spirit of the Bishop, and prayed that he may be long spared to preside over the diocese of St. John.—Globe.

DEATH OF MRS. McLEAN.—On Friday noon of last week, our citizens were startled by the report of the sudden death of Mrs. J. S. McLean, wife of J. S. McLean, foreman in the mining company's blacksmith's shop. Mrs. McLean was feeling unusually well in the morning and had been seen about her household affairs but a few minutes before noon, when Mr. McLean returned for dinner and found her dead in her chamber from heart disease. There was no person at the house but their little daughter, five years old, at the time of her death and she did not realize sufficiently to give an alarm. Mrs. McLean was thirty-two years of age; was born at Rosebank, Miramichi, New Brunswick, to which place Mr. McLean started on the Fourth with the remains, to deposit them in their last resting place, beside her father and mother, according to her wish. Mrs. McLean was a member of the Presbyterian church a devoted wife and leaves a large circle of friends to mourn her loss. The funeral services were held at the residence, conducted by Rev. Chas. Craven. At the head of the casket were placed handsome floral designs. The services were very impressive and solemn and the remains were followed to the depot by a large concourse of sorrowing friends.—Florence Mining News.

Our Fishing Grounds.
GREATER PROTECTION NEEDED AGAINST THOSE WHO POACH.
Mr. H. Wood's fishing party arrived from the Miramichi last night and put up at the Barker House. In conversation with a Gleaner representative this morning Mr. Wood said: "Of course this fishing business is nothing new to me. I have been coming here for the last 15 years. My fishing grounds are at Clearwater, on the Southwest Branch of the Miramichi. Our party this year included Joe Jefferson and his son, as well as Mr. Wm. Magee, of St. John. It was Mr. Jefferson's first trip and he was delighted with the country and with his success, having caught the largest salmon—one weighing 19 lbs. We were in camp about three weeks during which time we captured 40 salmon and 22 grills."

"Our fishing grounds are becoming well known among your people—the Americans." "Yes, but unless there be better protection there will be very little known of New Brunswick fishing grounds by American..."

can't the next 10 years?"
"I do not understand you."
"Well, I mean that the poachers are so numerous and their operations so extensive that all honest sportsmen, American and Canadian, are becoming disgusted. Our party spent about \$1,500 on this trip, yet they could not leave their guides out of their sight until the latter would be at the work of poaching. A great many are catching salmon with spear and net. The truth is that unless the Canadian Government afford better protection against all poachers, they will soon have the experience of the U. S. Government."

"In what you mean?"
"In having to re-stock the rivers. It has cost our Government \$500,000 to do this. The fishing grounds of New Brunswick are among the best in the world, and it is a shame to see them destroyed by these lawless poachers. It is the duty of every honest sportsman and of those who wish to encourage tourists to this province to endeavor to have the spear and netting of fish done away with."

An Improved Anchor.
The Morrison anchor is an improvement on the Pettis' anchor, under a patent granted to Capt. Morrison, Jan. 21, 1885. The following description will convey an idea of its construction and of its special merits:—

The shank, which has no stock and needs none, ends in a pair of lugs taking the form of an inverted U; the lower part of each lug has a shoulder fitting into a recess in the head, which is of an elliptical form, and a bolt passes on its shortest diameter through both lugs. The recesses in the head give great strength in tension and relieve the bolt from strain. To this bolt is attached a shackle holding to the buoy rope used to show the position of the anchor. A special advantage of this shackle is that the flukes strike foul of a rock, the buoy rope hauls will lift the flukes to the same line as the shank and clear the anchor so that it can be immediately lifted to the bow. This will be better understood when we say that the flukes are welded on the elliptical head at right angles to its circumference and are traversed by the bolt. The advantage of the elliptical head is that if the anchor falls flat the tension of the chain lifts the head on its longest diameter, and so the flukes immediately seize bottom, and as these are parallel we have two strongly anchored flukes instead of only one, as in the common anchor.

Again, if a ship anchors in shallow water there is danger, when swinging over the ordinary anchor, that she might prick her bottom on the projecting fluke, but here we have no possibility of such a mischief as both flukes rise as the ship is sidesteer in the pilot's case, for which everybody will give him credit.
