

An Ottawa despatch says, -

It appears that on the 9th inst. in view of the government's intention to incresse both excise and customs duties on spirits, the minister of inland revenue sent out word to the officers of his department not to allow any whiskey to be entered for excise unless taken out of bond subject to any additional duty the Government might impose. The minister of inland

> revenue got ahead of the minister of customs, for the latter did not issue instruction to his officers to allow whiskey to be entered for duty subject to the contemplated change of duty, and it was not till the 9th that this order went out of his department. The result was that while the distlllers had to pay the increased

excise duty on all spirits taken out after the sixth importers were allowed until the 9th to enter their whiskey under the old tariff. The distillers are here to-day insisting that they shall be placed in the same position as importers and be allowed to enter their whiskey taken out of bond between the 6th and 9th inst., under the old tariff. It is impossible to say what the Government will do in the matter.

The situation is rather an awkward one.


