STUMPAGE ON LUMBER was moved by Coun Baldwin:

Whereas, a depression in the lumber business of this Province has existed for several years past, and the outlook for the future does not justify any expectations of a better state of the market either on this side or the other side of the Whereas, the cost of procuring lumber from the Crown Lands of this Province is increasing from year to year, owing to it having to be procured more remotely from the rivers and out of the reach of the better facilities for transporting sup-

plies, driving, etc, and whereas the only chance for successfully prosecuting the business seems to lie in cheapening the supply of logs so as to place our lumbermen on an equal footing in this respect with those of other Provinces; and Whereas the taxation imposed by the Local Gov't on Crown Land lumber and bemlock bark had been gradually increased during the past twelve or more years until it has had the effect of crippling this important industry and is much in excess of similar taxation in either Quebec or

Nova Scotia; and Whereas the circumstances of the business under the existing depression subjects present lessees and operators to losses in the prosecution of their business, which in many cases they are obliged to continue even under existing difficul

Whereas the decline of this trade involves losof employment to all classes in the community and bears especially hard on this county and the North Shore generally, Therefore Resolved That this Council humbly petition His Honor the Lieut Governor in Coun cil and the Legislature to take the foregoing lacts into consideration, and make such a reduction in the present Crown Lands lumber taxation as the

Coun Whelan, who seconded the reso lution, said he did so with pleasure: In his opinion the resolution was so plainly worded, and its object so apparent, that comment seemed to be unnecessary.

Upon the question being called, Coun Betts said that while he agreed with the resolution in every particular, it did no go far enough to meet his views. There was another industry which needed to be relieved from a part of the burden of stumpage imposed upon it fully as much as did the lumber, and that was th hemlock bark industry, which gave employment to a large number of the people and was one of considerable importance to the county. He could quote figures to show its great importance as well as the need there was for a reduction of the stumpage, but this would be unnecessary. If the mover of the resolution would incorporate therein the words "and hemlock bark," he would most heartily support it.

Some of the councillors were of the opinion that the word "lumber" would include the bark. Others thought the legal interpretation of the word might be different: To avoid any possible misus. derstanding the mover agreed to insert the words, which appear in the resolution as given in this report.

W Park, Esq, M P P, being present,

was requested to address the Council: Mr Park said it was rather a surprise to him to be asked to speak on this question, but he would do so briefly. He thought his sentiments on the subject were well known. He was heartily in sympathy with the movement to decrease the stumpage on lumber and bark, and would use his best efforts to assist in bringing it about. He had done what he could to secure this in the past, but would be more energetic in the future. It was greatly to be regretted that the lumbering industry was declining, affecting as does the prosperity of the people. With this fact before them it was the duty of the Local Government to lighten the burdens of those engaged in the business, who find it difficult to conduct it profitably: The tax of \$1 25 per thousand feet was more than the lumbering interest of the Northern counties particularly could stand, especia as those engaged in it could not now make all ends meet. It was especially the duty of the Government to do its utmost to foster so important an industry, which gives so much employment to our people, and which takes up more capital than any other interest in the county, as well as in the adjoining counties. 
