The Law of Finding.

The law of finding is this: The finder has clear title against the world, except the owner. The proprietor of a coach, or a railroad car, or a ship, has no right to demand the property on a premise. Such proprietors may make regulations in regard to lost property which will blind their employes, but they cannot bind the public. The law of finding was declared by the King's Bench one hundred years ago, in a case in which the facts were as follows :-

The police have no especial rights in regard to articles lost, unless those rights are conferred by statute. Receivers of articles stolen are trustees for the owner or finder. They have no power in the absence of special statute to keep an article against the finder, any more than a finder has to retain an article against the owner. - Pan Handle Grocer.



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
