NOTICE.

Public notice is hereby given that a Bill will be introduced at the session of the New Brunswick Legislature to amend an Act passed at the last session of said Legislature entitled "An Act to authorize the extension of the railway on the lower Water Street in town of Chatham."

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It is enacted by the Lieutenant Governor, Legislative Council and Assembly as follows: That all matters relating to the control and management of Highways, Streets and Roads within the said District of the Miramichi shall be under the control and management, or in the administration of the Firewards of said Town, shall, as hereinafter provided, be under the control and management of a Board to be known as the Street and Fire Commissioners of the Town of Chatham.

Should a vacancy occur at any time by the death, resignation, removal from the District or otherwise of a member of the Board, the Lieutenant Governor is authorized to appoint a person to fill the vacancy in the same manner as provided in the Municipalities Act for filling vacant County or Parish Offices.

It is said that Mr. John O'Brien of Nelson, when coaxing his neighbors to sign the requisition did not remind them of Messrs Adams and Park's opposition to the Nelson Bridge, or of his own statement in the public meeting at Nelson that the government could not be expected to build it.

The Advocate has, at last, been permitted to refer to the subject of the requisition and intimates that "Residents of Newcastle, Chatham, Nelson, Derby and Rogersville have formed an organization with the view of securing the return of four members to the Local Legislature who will work shoulder to shoulder for the general interests of Northumberland and the Northern section of the Province.

Several suggestions have been made by gentlemen of experience in the management of our street and fire services with a view of improving the provisions of the above bill. On the question of combining the two services there seems to be no difference of opinion.

It has been suggested, since the meeting of Council that the money required for road and street services might be raised in the same way as the fire and police funds. At present there is a poll-tax of three days' labor, or ninety cents, on every resident. It has been suggested that this statute labor tax be set aside and a poll assessment of fifty to seventy-five cents be substituted, the necessary balance to be made a property and income tax in the usual way and collected by the collector of rates with the other town assessment.

It is an alteration making the upper limit of the street district Clarke's Cove, as at present, will be necessary. It has been suggested, since the meeting of Council that the money required for road and street services might be raised in the same way as the fire and police funds.

It is a feeling abroad that until the policy and merits of the two parties are more thoroughly discussed, this effort to secure promises of support are exceedingly ill-timed and display a fear on the part of Messrs. Park and Adams that they cannot face the people in the ordinary way but desire to snatch a verdict on an *ex parte* hearing and, having a lawyers' assistance, to bring the non-professional constituency will not discover the meaning of the trick until it is too late.

It might be expected that gentlemen of the position of Mr. John Fish of Newcastle who, with Mr. John D. Creighton, went up the Northwest Miramichi to get signatures to the requisition, would abstain from the barefaced misrepresentation which we are informed he resorted to in order to get respectable men's names on their paper. A reliable correspondent, writing from Southesk, says these gentlemen assured him there was to be a dissolution of the House by the Lieut. Governor just as soon as it assembled at Fredericton; also that they charged the present Government with all manner of mismanagement and misdoings and "John Fish also told me that it was 'highly in the interest of Mr. Snowball that this move was being made. To this, of course, I could make no reply as I did not know 'the truth or falsehood of the matter.'"

When this precious Newcastle committee sent men through the County to utter such barefaced falsehoods as that Mr. Snowball favors the proposed ticket, or any candidate in opposition to the present local Government, it shows how desperate their case is. Mr. Snowball is known to be in Great Britain and these leading citizens take advantage of his absence to use his name in order to further their corrupt design of inducing two supporters of the Government to give the lie to their whole political record.

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
