

Mr. Jack's legal abilities were recognized by his being appointed advocate general of government. From that time until his

decease Mr. Jack held arel attended to the duties of that office. In the early part of his career Mr. Jack was once a candidate for the house of assembly, but he failed to gain his election. He was always a strong opponent of confederation and wrote a series of able letters in support of his views on that question to the London Times, which excited much comment at the time, and drew

Mr. Jack had an extensive legal pracequity court, where he was very successful. He was counsel for the defence in many noted insurance cases. When the St. John Law Society was formed Mr. Jack was elected as its first president, an onor which he held until two years ago, when Dr. Weldon was elected president, and honorary life membership was conferred on him. By his death, and that of Mr. David Shank Kerr, the society has lost the only honorary life members it had.

In his social life Mr. Jack was known as a courteous gentleman, a kind father and affectionate husband. He leaves a widow and nine children, two sons and seven daughters. One of the former is Mr. I. Allen Jack, recorder of the city of St. John, the other, William, is residing in New York. His eldest daughter married Dr. Thomas Walker; another, Mrs. W. W.
