Demurrage.

HARLEY, MATHEW, & CO. v. STEWART AND ANOTHER.

On Friday, the 10th inst., this case was concluded before Mr. Justice Grove and a special Jury in the Queen's Bench Division. The hearing lasted four days. The owners of the steamship Gwalia were the plantiffs, and Messrs, R. A. & J.

Stewart, merchants, of Cardiff and St. John, (N. B.), were the defendants. The action was brought to recover a sum of £393 6s. 31., alleged to be due from the defendants as charterers of the Gwalia, which was loaded at Bathurst with deals, battens, and boards for the east coast, and with reference to the amount claimed for balance of freight the defendants admitted their liability and paid £214 into Court. Sir W. Phillimore, Q. C., and Mr. Aspinall appeared for the plantiffs; and Mr. B. F. Williams, Q. C., and Mr. Jones for the

defendants. The main question at issue in the action was as to liability of the defendants for six days' demurrage at £30 per day. 
