The past year has not been particulary remarkable within the Dominion. The session of Parliament was more routine than distinguished for new legislation. A. dull calm followed the Northwest debates and the effort in the Franchise Bill of last year, exhausted its reproductive functions. The penchant for government control of public and private enterprise, and the creation of more scope for patronage. showed itself in the appointment of a roving Committee, to take evidence and report as to the need and advantages of a Commission to 'handle' all the railways, in regard to freight and tariff -another exmple of that interference with individual an I corporate liberty, which seems to be the spirit of the age. The results of the local elections begiaing with New Brunswick last spring, indicate a change in public opinion not favorable to the government of Sir John A. Macdonald. It is doubtless not advisable that D minion and Local issues should be mixed, nevertheless they are and will be. so that we may gracefully drop the correct theory and face the fact. The local streams flow into the general current of political opinion and accelerate its movement in one dire ction. This Province sent Mr. Blair back with an almost unanimous Assembly behind him. The opposition was worse than annihilated. It is caput mortuum. 
