In 1835 Mr. McAvity married Miss Isabel Sandall, by whom he had a large family of sons and daughters. A note worthy event in the career of the deceased gentlemen was the visit of His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales to St. John while he was its mayor. It is unnecessar, to say that Mr. McAvity discharged the duties of that occasion with a dignity and tact that reflected credit upon himself and the city.

At the time of his death, Mr. McAvity had spent more years in business than any other merchant in St. John, and thus the city loses one of the founders of its mercantile prosperity. In 1835, and for many subsequent years, the principal business of the city was transacted on Prince William and Water streets and on the North Wharf.


