No one shall fish for, catch, kill. smelts between the first of April and the death. first of July. 2nd, The use of smelts for hibited. 4th Smelts shall not be fished for, caught or killed by means of any size than one inch and a quarter extention measure. The use of bag nets for the purpose of catching smelts is probibited except under special licence from the Minister of Marine and Fisheries, and then only between the first of December and the fifteenth of February.

IS LEFT WIFELESS AND PENNILESS IN NEW

about four years ago to make his fortune in museums and circuses in the neighboring republic, very little has been heard of He seems to have met with much success in his exhibition business, which, however, has terminated very unluckily and which brings the queer little fellow to our notice again. There was something of a sensation, says a New York paper under date of Oct 29, at the police headquarters yesterday afternoon, when a muscular man strode in with a queer looking bundle in his arms. He went into the bureau of information and there set the bundle down at his feet. Then it shook itself and proved to be a queer little man who explained with dignity, despite his three and a half feet in height, that he was Lewander Baldwin, the armless wonder. The little fellow had a club foot, crooked legs, no arms, but an intelligence which became quite expressive when he talked. This is the pitiful story he told: "He has been travelling about the country with a circus, exhibiting himself as a freak for \$50 a week. Last week the circus disbanded at Frenchtown, N. J., and Friday night he and his wife, a woman of about 30 years old and of the average size, took a Pennsylvania railroad train to New York city. They had with them several trunks and \$250 which they had saved. When they arrived in town they went to a lodging-house at 441 Greenwich street, where they remained until yesterday morning. At about 9 o'clock Mrs Baldwin went out to buy her husband some breakfast, taking with her the money and trunk checks. Since then she has not been seen." Baldwin has in consequence of her disappearance been left destitute. His only friend in New York city was a sister named Tourgeon, whose name was not in the directory, and whose address the little fellow did not know. The armless wonder has a number of friends and relatives living about Bathurst who will regret to learn of his great hardships. He was on his way to Boston, where he had secured his engagement in a museum, when he got into his plight. Baldwin is now twenty-five years old, and, it is said, writes and draws with his toes with as good result as many experienced draughtsmen.

Oil Found in Gaspe. A Dalhousie despatch of Wednesday last to the Gleaner says:-"The find of oil in Gaspe last winter is proving to be a most important discovery. HOW THE TORIES PROPOSE TO SETTLE TH

NEW YORK, Nov. 5. T. P.
