Passing on the Sidewalks.

People meeting each other on our side walks appear, very often, to hesitate, as if not knowing on which side they ought to pass. Those who know that the law requiries them to pass to the right, and that there is a penalty for not doing so, are frequently obliged to go to the left or come in collision with those who seem to care little for either law or public con-

venience. The Municipal by-law on the subject reads as tollows :-


