Mr. LeBlanc committed the bill to a separate committee of the House to report on the subject.

A number of local and private bills were advanced to-day, the attention of members being largely taken up by the horse and fisheries bills.

Mr. Tweedie committed the bill to authorize increased assessment for police purposes on the town of Chatham.

The fisheries act amendment bill was committed by Mr. Mitchell and agreed to without the proposed amendment relating to forfeiture of mining licenses.

Mr. Blair recommitted the bill relating to the duties of the office of the Public Works, Mr. Blair in the chair.

Mr. Blair committed the bill respecting assignments for the benefit of creditors. Mr. Blair in the chair.

Mr. Blair said this measure was so important as one that would, no doubt, provoke discussion. It provides for the appointment of trustees in each county in the provinces to whom debtors may make assignments.

Under the present law a debtor may assign to a person interested in furthering the claims of some creditors, while disregarding the claims of others.

The present difficulty is due to the fact that there is no insolvency law. He was aware of the fact that this legislature had no power to pass an insolvency act.

Under this bill debtors would have no chance of making preferences, and creditors would be placed in a much better position than now, when private parties are appointed as trustees.

There are too many cases where their work is not done effectively. If the trustees held their positions through appointment by the lieutenant governor it was reasonable to expect that another state of affairs would prevail.

There was nothing compulsory in the bill; under it no one was compelled to assign, but it was intended to apply to cases where debtors had assigned.

As assignment has been made it was desirable that the estate should be wound up as speedily as possible, and that the distribution should be on an equitable basis.

The principal object of the bill was to prevent fraudulent preferences. He further explained the bill and said that if the provisions of the bill were considered too stringent the government would be pleased to have suggestions from any member of the committee.

Mr. Alward agreed with the attorney general that the present law was unsatisfactory and fully concurred with him in what he had said in reference to fraudulent preferences.

He read the 6th and 25th sections of this bill, and gave it as his opinion that they contained the elements of the law of insolvency, and, therefore, it would be a wise step for this legislature to pass such an act.

Mr. Blair said the view of the hon. gentleman had not escaped the attention of the government. It is proper for us to assert our rights rather than by abstaining to declare an opinion and admit that we have no right.

The report was adopted and resolutions passed that the address be engrossed, and that Mr. Speaker sign it on behalf of this assembly.
