My grandfather was a sea captainnot a mere claimant of the title, like the watermen of the lakes and the coast skippers who never get out of sight of land. and who, if they got there, could never get back-but a genuine 'old salt,' trained from boyhood under a tarpaulin hat, and as familiar with the 'paths of the sea' as a shepherd is with those of a sheep walk. Spending his life on extended voyages, he was seldom at home long enough at a time for the salt spray to dry on his weatherbeaten cheeks; and there was hardly a port on the habitable globe in which he could not shake hands with an old acquaintance, civilized or savage.

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
