The Case of the "Libertas."

The French barque Libertas, which was detained off Chatham by the Collector of Customs while proceeding to sea from Newcastle on Saturday, 10th inst still lies at anchor off the town and seems likely to remain there for some time to come. Capt. Carmugle, the master of the vessel, declares that he is innocent of the charge laid against him. Basket. viz., smuggling brandy. It appears that the collector received information which led to the belief that the fourteen cases of brandy seized by him at Mr. Harry Brobecker's dwelling in Chatham came to the port in the Libertas and it was for this offence that she was detained. In fact, the papers forwarded by the Commissioner of Customs, Ottawa, state that the detention is for smuggling brandy. On Tuesday Captain Carmugle and his crew-all but one man who is ill and a boy of fourteen, who has deserted the ship-solemnly swore that no brandy had been smuggled into the port or landed from the Libertas. This defence has been forwarded to the Commissioner of Customs and it will be some days before his recommendation thereon will go to the minister for his action.

At the time the vessel was detained the officers found on board a quantity of Tobacco and Sardines, which had. not been reported, and this, of course. renders the vessel liable to fine as having made a false entry. It does not appear, however, that the Captain has been called upon to make any defence
