STOCK BREEDING IN CANADA. There are perhaps few incidents that transpire, better calculated to illustrate the progress which stock-breeding is making in Canada, than the marked improvements in the character of the importations of pure bred stock, and this improvement Clydesdale horses as in any other branch of our live stock imports.
