The St. Croix mills have received permission to compete with Mr. Gibson as they see fit by selling at their own prices regardless of monopoly regulations. A fight may commence this spring as to which combine is the most successful. The public, however, should not lose sight of the fact that they owe a debt of gratitude to Mr. Gibson, who has so ably withstood the action of the combine."

Fly-Casting. The annual Fly-casting Tournament at Harlem Mere in Central Park, New York, began on the morning of the 23rd ult., under favorable conditions of wind and weather, there being comparatively little of the former and none of the latter worth mentioning--a cloud-dial sky with an occasional "spit" of rain, an untroubled water surface and a soft spring air, neither too warm nor too cool, forming a combination to which no objection could be made even by the most captious. Two "records" were badly broken Mr. Hawes in the salmon fly-casting class scoring 158 feet as against R. C. Leonard's record of last year of 142 feet, and in the single-handed fly-casting, "expert" class, Mr. R. C. Leonard scoring 102 feet as against his own record of last year of 97 feet.
