Dublin Show a new feature was introduced into the programme. This was an exhibition of sheep dogs at work, and it proved to be one of the greatest attractions Yesterday there was a heavy rain storm of the show. In this novel competition fifteen competitors entered the lists, most of them hailing from Wales, which divides with Scotland the honor of having the best trained dogs in the world. By way o testing capacities of the animals thorough ly, some of the wildest sheep that could be found were brought from Wales, and were placed in triplets, consisting of a ewe and her two lambs. These, of course, are unusually difficult to manage, because as soon as the collie attempts to drive the ewe the quarry stands at bay for the protection of her lambs.
