### The Public Health.

With the view of preventing the spread of disease and improving the sanitary con dition of the country, the local legislature at its lest session passed an act "Respecting the Public Health," authorizing the executive to appoint a board to be known as the "Provincial Board of Health of New Brunswick" to carry out its provisions. The act also directed that the province be divided in twenty-five health districts, each of which shall have its and perfect satisfaction is guaranteed local board of health.

PROVINCIAL BOARD OF HEALTH. The Provincial Board of Health was organized in June last. The first meeting was held in St, John and since then the board has held two meetings, the one which convened last month being the first annual meeting. The members of the provincial board are as follows :-Dr. Wm. Bavard, chairman: St. John.

The chairman and secretary are both appointed by the government, The sec retary by virtue of his office, is the chief health officer of the province. The annual meeting is held in Fredericton in January. The work done by the board so far has been mainly organization of the provincial board, and later, the organization of local

LOCAL BOARDS OF HEALTH. The act provides that the province shall e divided in 25 health districts, with a board of health for each district. The expense of maintaining a local board is very small, and what there is, is borne by the municipality in which they are located. The expense of maintaining local boards is still further reduced by the provincial board supplying all blank forms with return postage necessary for carrying on the work between the physicians and the local boards and between the local boards and the provincial boards.
