is off the same pattern as that in the Morrison mill at Fredericton, which has cut 50,000 sup. ft. of lumber in ten hours. The compound edger operates four twenty. two inch saws and is admitted to be the best edger made in New Brunswick. The lath machines have each a cutting capacity of 60,000 per day of ten hours.

Last fall one of their compound edgers and also a lath machine were furnished by these works to Messrs. Hilyard of Portland for their mill at that place.

Among the work which our reporter found in progress the other day was a compound edger similar to the above for Mr. Scott Fairley; also a triple expansion

engine for Mr. H. A. Muirhead's new steamer now under construction in the shipyard connected with the works. Its cylinders are 11, 14 and 26 inches respectively in diameter, with 12-inch stroke. 


