FLY-FISHING IN SALT WATER.—"A quiet event came off here yesterday," writes a Pall Mall Gazette correspondent from Stornoway. "Sir John Morris was fishing in the bay (in the salt water) when, noticing no end of salmon cruising about, he thought he would try them with a salmon fly, and he bagged no less than five. For salmon to rise to the fly in salt water is a most uncommon event."

BURGLARY AT NEWCASTLE.—Late on Saturday night or early on Sunday morning last the store of Messrs. Thomas Clark & Co., at Newcastle, was forcibly entered by burglars and a quantity of goods taken therefrom. The burglars effected an entrance by the cellar window, the sash of which had been removed for the purpose of ventilation, the aperture having several iron bars across it. The loss is estimated at from \$60 to \$100. So far there is no clue to the thieves.

LARGE MACKEREL.—Says a Summer-side paper: Mr. Rob Angus, manager of the Telephone Company, had on exhibition at the Hotel Russ, on Wednesday evening, the largest mackerel ever caught here. It measured 23 inches in length, about 5 inches in width, and weighs 3 lbs. 6 oz. It was hooked at Tignish, by Capt. Frank Galligan. Mr. Angus intends to have it stuffed and sent to Washington to show the Americans what kind of mackerel we get inside the three mile limit.

EQUITY COURT.—In Matheishe vs. Cairnel, judgment was delivered deciding that the plaintiff had a lien on the deals which were upon his wharf at the time the order was made to deliver them up. His Honor decided that the plaintiff was entitled to \$100 in addition to the \$556 given him by the verdict of the jury. Ordered that Cairnel, one of the defendants, pay all the costs of this suit. All other questions reserved with liberty to either party to apply.

MR. RUSSELL'S LAST TEXTS.—Rev. John Robbins at close of last Sabbath morning's sermon briefly referred to the death of Rev. Alex. Russell of Dalhousie, N. B. Mr. Russell while resident in Truro being a communicant of above church. Mr. Russell had prepared his sermons for the coming Sabbath and the text in both cases were prophetic, the morning sermon being from the words, "I have finished the work that I gave me to do" and the evening text from the words, "It is finished." But before the sermons were preached he had passed away.—Colchester Star.

IV, 2, emphasizing the preaching of the word as the highest work delegated to man, after which the Bishop, assisted by Mr. Crisp, administered the communion.—World.

GLOUCESTER CIRCUIT COURT opened at Bathurst on Tuesday, Hon. Judge MacCallister presiding. The trial of the case of N. B. Trading Co. vs. Northumberland was postponed, and the venue changed to Northumberland. The case of the Administratrix of the late John Carney against the Carapuet Railway was going on yesterday. Mrs. Carney claims \$20,000 for herself and children as recompense for the loss of the husband and father's protection, as well as for the loss of the pecuniary benefits which they expected to receive from the continuation of his life. The ground of action is that the bridge was to the knowledge of the defendants improperly constructed, and that it was owing to the negligence of the defendant company that Carney was carried over the bridge and killed. The defendants' plea is that the bridge was safely and efficiently constructed, but that very shortly before the accident it was damaged by the heavy storm and consequent high tide, of which damage the defendants were entirely ignorant. The late Very Rev. Father Egan.—Anniversary Service in St. Patrick's Church, St. Louis, August 25th, 1888. The Church of St. Patrick's, Nelson, was, on Tuesday last week, crowded by an assembly of devout worshippers, who came as well to pay a tribute of respect to the memory of their late beloved patriarchal pastor as to unite in offering the holy sacrifice of the Mass and fervent prayers for the eternal repose of his soul.

The respect in which Father Egan was held by all classes of the community needed no proofs to those who enjoyed the pleasure of his acquaintance.
