### (Boston Post.) The annual dinner of the Megantic Fish

and Game club was held at Young's last night, Vice-President Pettingail presiding. About one hundred gentlemen were present and about three hours were passed at the banquet and in informal conversation. At the conclusion of the banquet W. H.H. Murray was received with great cordiality. He gave a glowing description of the Canadian forests and their great natural resources of fish and game. He said: "The greatest charm in my mind consists in trapping, and the trapper's life is the most intellectual and satisfying. It is a matter of regret that few sportsmen are equipped with a set of traps. In the North woods are found all varieties of fur begring game, several species of which particularly the black fox, are very valuable both as trophies or articles of merchandise. North of Quebec the fishing is superb, but there is little sport except feather game. The prevailing trees are the birch, and the scenery is entirely of dark green, relieved by straw colored patches. In the lakes of these regions is found a species of land-locked salmon, The Lake St. John is the centre of the fishing grounds. Into it flow eight large rivers, into which flow about twenty-seven minor tributaries, well stocked with trout and aquatic birds. The region is easily accessible. You leave here on Monday at 8 a. m., and arrive at Quebec Tuesday morning, and can reach the lake at 3 o'clock in the afternoon.
