





at ail - [Charlottetown Patriot.] begins in this Bay a month too soon; that the 10th of October is early enough to fish. Take last autumn as an example. What was done? Thousands of barrels of oy sters were given away, almost. The

prices were forty and fifty cents a barrel, when, a month after, when navigation was still open, oysters from the same grounds were worth one dollar. This is no hearsay, as I sold them and know what I write to be a fact. The weather is warm in Sept. and the
