Do Flying Fish Fly?

It has long been a question with scientists whether flying fish actually fly, or are only carried forward through the air by the impulse which they gave to their bodies while still in the water. Professor Mobins expresses an authoritative opinion, and claims that they are totally unable to fly, for the reason that the muscles which move the pectoral fins are not sufficiently large to bear the weight of their bodies in the air. In birds the average weight of the muscles which are concerned in the movement of the wings is one-sixth that of the entire body; in bats one-thirteenth, while in the flying fish it is only one-thirtyfifth. He affirms, therefore, that the impulse to the propulsion of the fish in the air is delivered while they are still in the water .- Globe-Democrat.

Professor Mobins is quite mistaken, and has, evidentally, not seen flying fish on the wing. It is true that they acquire considerable impetus before rising out of the water, but this is only sufficient to give them a certain elevation and start, after which they fly quite long distances, either in a straight or gradually curved line. We have seen them fly several hundred yards before plunging again into the sea and have known them to come in the night from the leeward and, striking the weather bulwarks inside, fall upon the deck.

SEC, 7.—The lather of any child born in this Province, or in case of his death or absence, the mother, or in case of the death or inabilty of both parents, any person standing in the place of the parents, or if none such there be, then the occupier of the house or tenement in which to his knowledge such child was born, or the nurse present at the birth, shall, within 30 days from the date of such birth give notice thereof to the registrar of the Division in which such child was born, given as far as possible the particulars required in Schedule A.

SEC. 11.—The occupier of the house or tenement in which a death takes place, of if the occupier be the person who has died, then some one of the persons residing in the house in which the death took place, or if such death has not taken place within a house then any person present at the death or having knowledge of the circumstances attending the same, or the coron-
