SEC. 11.—The occupier of the house or tenement in which a death takes place, of if the occupier be the person who has died, then some one of the persons residing in the house in which the death took place, or if such death has not the death took place, or if such death has not taken place within a house then any person present at the death or having knowledge of the circumstances attending the same, or the coroner vho attended any inquest held on such person shall supply to the Division Registrar of the Division in which such death took place, according to his or her knowledge or belief, all the particulars required to be registered touching such death, by the form provided by this act, Schedule C.
