The Brigade Camp

We have little to add this week to what we said last week on the subject of the Brigade Camp. It has been here and is gone. Our people were interested and instructed by it, and there was, throughout the whole organization, general satisfaction expressed with Chatham as a locality in every way suited for such a gathering.

Amongst the camp duties performed during the latter part of last week was the inspection of the Engineers on Thursday by Capt. Davidson who found them in better order than in 1886 and 1887 when they were pronounced very efficient.

The inspection ended, they proceeded to the Canada wharf and dismantled the bridge constructed on Wednesday. Their work on Thursday also included profiling a field road for half battalion.

The Cavalry were at skirmishing drill in extended order, mounting and dismounting, etc. In the afternoon they engaged at drill with the rest of the brigade.

On Thursday evening, at 8 o'clock, the School Corps pitched a tent in three minutes, and struck it in one minute. In the tug-of-war, Thursday evening, the artillery won against the 74th, and the 73rd against the Infantry School men.

On Friday the troops were drawn up on the drill grounds, south of the camp, at 2.30, and proceeded in column of route through Chatham and towards the Lobban fields, with the customary advance and rear guards composed of cavalry, artillery and infantry.

The fighting line was also opened fire, and pushed on rapidly over every piece of open ground. The Brigade, in the meanwhile, had been deployed, and was now advancing in fours from the right of companies, the better to move through the country, partly covered with stunted spruce trees.

On Saturday morning the different corps struck tents and nearly all departed for their local headquarters—a few only remaining to look after the Government property. In his Brigade orders the Commandant says "the first Camp of the different arms formed in the fine County of Northumberland has been most successful in every important particular."

Northumberland Municipal Council.

The Municipal Council of Northumberland met on Tuesday at 12 o'clock, Warden Betts in the chair. All members of the Council were present excepting Coun. Robinson, Derby, and Coun. Hovey, Ludlow.

The minutes of last day's session in January were read and confirmed. Mr. Cottier was, on motion of Coun. Ryan, appointed Constable to attend at the present session, upon Council.

The Secretary-Treasurer said the question was one which would require time for consideration. Coun. Adams referring to the new jail, said the same report submitted by Messrs Shirreff & Fish, of the Committee, last January session, was before Council still.

Provision was made for the sending of missionary deputations to various Missions to advocate the claims of the Diocesan Church Society. The following are the representatives from the various Denominations for the ensuing year:

Chatham—Rev. D. Forsyth. Kingston—Rev. S. J. Hanford. Fredericton—Rev. H. Montgomery. Woodstock—Rev. A. Lowndes. St. John—Rev. W. D. Raymond.

The Anniversary Service of the Society was held in Trinity Church on Thursday evening at 8 o'clock. There was a large congregation present and the sermon was delivered by the Rev. John DeSoyres, Rector of St. John's Church.

Our Fisheries.

A detailed statement in the Lunenburg Progress shows that there were landed at that port this season, from April 18th to July 2nd, 20,355 quintals of codfish, 9,160 quintals of green fish and 23,150 pounds of halibut.
