The pro ceedings began at 10 o'clock on Wednesday, July 4th, the Rev. Canon Brigstocke, as Ecclesiastical Commissary, taking the Chair. The Rev. O. S. Newnham was elected Secretary pro tem, in the absence of Rev. Canon Medley, who is in England, as Chaplain of the Metropolitan.

After the reading of minutes and rollcall, the chairman read the following letter from the Metropolitan :-To the Clergy and Laity of the Diocese o Fredericton in Synod assembled:

Reverend and Dear Brethren:

I have been requested by His Grace the Archbishop of Canterbury to attend a conference of bishops to be held at Lambeth in the month of July next, to consider Samuel Russell, Esq., of Millerton, is several matters of importance to the the archbishop. The resolutions which may be adopted at the conference of so many of our fathers in God, presiding the sister church of America, though not binding upon us as canons, will no doubt receive the most respectful and attentive consideration; and I have felt that I could not with propriety decline to be present at this conference. On no other ground should I be willing to be absent from you at a time when the presence and counsel of your Bishop seems to be especially required, both at the annual meeting of the Diocesan Church Society and at the meeting of the Synod. I rely, however, on the wise and zealous co-operation of the clergy and laity of the Diocese to adopt such resolutions as are calculated to promote its extension and prosperity, And take this opportunity of expressing a ope that it will not be necessary to abanon any of the work which the church has undertaken, and that by united and harvented. I have appointed the Reverend Canon Brigstocke to be my Commissary to transact such business, as it may be necessary to do during my absence, and the

At a meeting of the County Council of the Municipality of Northumberland, held at Newcastle, in and the said County, on Tuesday, the Third day of July, A D 1888.

Resolved, that the following Bye Laws be made and established for the Government of the said A BYE-LAW FOR THE PRESERVATION OF ORDER: Be it ordained, by the Municipal cil of the County of Northumberland. Section 2 of Bye Law No 10 "for the preser vation of order" is hereby repealed. Whoever shall shout, or make any unusual noise in, or upon anyof the streets, highways, lanes, squares or wharves of the County, calculated to disturb or annoy the inhabitants, or shall conduct or participate in any street parades accompanied by beating of drums or playing nusical instruments in or upon any streets highways or squares, unless upon written per-mit frem the Councillors of each Parish, or in the cases of the Towns of Newcastle or Chatham

respectively. In permit of a majority of the Police Committee of said Towns, shall be liable to a penalty of \$4. A BYELAW RELATING TO CATTLE GOING AT LARGE: Be it ordained by the Municip Council of the County of Northumberland— No ox, Cow or neat cattle shall be allowed to go or be at large within the following districts viz In the Parish of Newcastle, within the district bounded westerly by the upper line of the lands owned and occupied by James Falconer, easterly by Leddens Hill or Lane, northerly by the Queen's (new) Highway and southerly by the Miramichi River. In the Parish of Chatham within the district bounded on the east by the westerly side of

Frost Street, on the west by the westerly side of the property owned by L J Tweedie, Esq., southerly by Church Street and northerly by 2. Any Bye-Law heretofore made or repugnant te or inconsistent with the foregoing Section is hereby repealed.

All the penalties by Bye-Law No 6 made at large, shall apply to any violatian of the foregoing section not in like cases; and all fees payable thereunder, may be demanded and recovered by the Hogreeves, Constables and Pound Keepers, respectively for performing their several duties under this Bye-Law.




