

LAKE MISTASSINI.

A Hitherto Unknown Body of Water Thoroughly Explored. For many years it has been supposed that a great inland sea, called Lake Mistassini, existed far up about the 50th parallel of lati-

tude in Canada. It is a gloomy, sterile region, and the Indian hunters and trappers who went there often reported stories of famine among those whose lot had been cast there. During the past summer Professor W. J. Louden, of the University of Toronto, and Mr. George Sandfield MacDonald undertook the exploration of the lake, and have returned and written an account of their

trip for The New York Herald.

LAKE MISTASSINL They left Quebec on July 13 last, and went to Robrival. Thence, after obtaining an addition to their outfit and a guide and three men, the party worked their way up the Achamouchouan river, ascending rapids and portages, securing plenty of fish, on which | Chase, and contemplates publishing a volume diet they principally subsisted. On July 30 of personal memoirs. they reached Lake Achamouchouan. Along Miss Emily Stevenson, one of the chief the route they met Indians whose condition confirmed the stories that had been told of the scant food obtained by the inhabitants of

After traversing the lake from its southern to its northern extremity they entered the mouth of Toquoco river. Here they stepped ashore and congratulated each other. They had reached the limit of their

intended exploration. The next morning, after paddling up the river for two hours, they came in sight of some hills about five miles distant. Leaving their canoe they tramped across a swamp and ascended the highest of these hills. The day M. Zebrikova, a well known essayist, are at was clear, and from a height of 2,000 feet the whole region to the north of the lake was visible. Below, on a broad plateau, the country could be seen for a distance of seventyfive miles, and they were enabled to make some excellent drawings. After gaining all the information required to complete a map, the party started back on their journey out

of the wilderness. Records of temperature which they examined indicate that the winters are extremely cold and summers are very short. There is abundance of fish, but about the only meat to be obtained is bear meat. Furs are plenty, and securing the hides of animals with which to keep the ladies of more southern climates warm in winter is about all any one finds to do. A Novel Idea. A novel attraction in the shape of a palace of black diamonds is to be seen on the Sangamon Fair association grounds at Springfield, Ills. The entire structure is in reality a palace of coal, as it is built of rough blocks of coal dug out of the Sangamon county

Bullard & Bullard are the architects of this building. which is certainly a picturesque feature of the Sangamon fair and Springfield's exposition. The original idea was suggested by The Illinois State Journal to Col. Charles F. Mills, secretary of the association, and in two days he had the coal operators of the city thoroughly alive with the novel idea of drawing attention to the coal of their county by erecting a palace of coal on the fair ground. The formal opening of the palace was attended with much ceremony. Senator Shelby M. Cullom delivered an address on "Coal in Commerce" and Pat H. Donnelly, late secretary of the Illinois Miners' Protective association, one on "Coal Miners," and there were also several other addresses.

The Butter Extractor.

The improved system of dairy management now in use was, as might be expected, fully demonstrated at the late Royal Agriculture show. Cream is no longer, in the most progressive dairies. allowed to rise spontaneously, but centrifugal separators, whirling the fresh milk in many hundred revolutions a minute, cause the heavier particles to seek the circumference of the vessel, while the lighter cream collects in the center and is drawn off in a fresh state. At the Windsor show an improvement on these centrifugal separators was introduced under the name of "Butter Extractor." With this the milk enters the machine as in ordinary extractors, and the skim milk is delivered in much the same manner, the great difference being that instead of cream being delivered by the other tube, butter is given out in the granulated form. Although much interest was excited by the butter extractor, the fact that its appliances are quite complicated will, it is thought, render its coming into common use at present somewhat uncertain. It was exhibited by the Aylesbury dairy and is manufactured by the Extractor company, of Stockholm,

The shock causes the earth to tremble for a considerable distance around. and a cloud of vapor rises over the spot which is sometimes visible for sixty or seventy miles.

Mammoth cave, the largest in the world near Green river, Ky., has been explored ten miles. Time for Sowing Wheat.

and keeping.

There have doubtless been instances where a few days difference in the time for sowing wheat has had a large and exceptional influence on the success of the crop. This may have resulted from other causes than the exact time. Series of experiments have been made to determine the best time, by sowing at regular stated intervals, resulting in a gradual diminution in the crop from the latter part of September till early in November, the latter proving small and poor. The fertility and condition of the soil has a large controlling influence, and if finely pulverized, it will give much greater returns than in badly prepared land. Artificial fertilizers, and especially superphosphates, produce a great improvement on some soils, and on others they have produced too little benefit to pay cost. 
