Miramichi on "The Sound". Mr. Peter Turner, formerly of Chatham, seems to be at the head of a new and thriving industry on the Pacific coast. The Port Townsend Argus of 17th ult. says: "Among the recently established industries in this vicinity deserving of encouragement is that of Turner, Haven & Co., on Snow Bay. These gentlemen have secured on the land about a half mile from the 'spit' about two months ago, and they now have two large and well arranged smoke houses and a wharf, and have in course of construction a warehouse 40 by 70 feet. Their output in smoked salmon is six tons each week, the market being the sound cities and Portland, and to an extensive business in putting up jars of sardines none of which are sent to market until they have been in the jars two weeks. The company owns thirty acres of land where the smoke houses are, and which has been recently platted and called Eastport. It is a suburb of Glenan but just across the bay. The lots will be sold to families only, and, we believe, to those engaged in the business of fishing. The Messrs. Turner & Haven are men of clear grit, which is plainly shown by their entering into what is practically a new business in this neighborhood, which they believed it would pay and it has."

Marriage of Mr. Killam, M. P. P. There was quite a social flutter at Doaktown on Wednesday last week at the residence of Mr. J. L. Murray, when Mr. A. E. Killam, M. P. P., of Moncton, and Mrs. Mary A. Hallett, sister of Mrs. Murray and of Mr. J. D. McKay, late of Chatham, were married by Rev. T. G. Johnston, pastor of the Blackville Presbyterian church. After breakfasting at Mr. Murray's, Mr. and Mrs. Killam went by Northern & Western train to Fredericton, being met at the depot by Mr. J. D. McKay, in one of the Queen Hotel's noisiest turnouts, and driven to that gentleman's residence where luncheon was served to the happy couple, who left by the noon train for Moncton, via St. John.

Report of the Miramichi Ladies Auxiliary Bible Society. The sixty-ninth annual meeting of the Miramichi Ladies Auxiliary Bible Society was held in the Temperance Hall, Chatham, on the 25th Sept. Miss Mary Chalmers, President, occupied the chair. Rev. W. Aitken opened the meeting with prayer. A letter was read from the Secretary of the Parent Society, acknowledging the receipt of a free contribution of \$300, congratulating the Miramichi Ladies' Auxiliary on its continued prosperity, and conveying the refreshing tidings of the marked success of the Society's work throughout the world during the past year.

Rev. Mr. McCoy, pastor of St. Andrew's church, preached a temperance sermon on Sunday evening last, from the text, 'I will inherit the Kingdom of God.' Treating intemperance as an admitted evil, he showed that it was condemned of God, as proved by His word, a defilement of man as His temple, a sin against the Almighty, against man, himself, against society and the family, and a bar of the soul, from heaven. The arguments presented in support of the preacher's position were logical, practical and effective. The sermon was well calculated to encourage total abstinence as the only safe practice, and the best for both individuals and the community.

Rev. R. S. Quisp, of the Methodist church preached on the same subject on Sunday, taking his text from, 'Either I—8—'and the drinking was according to the law. The sermon was against drinking, whether sponsored by law or not, the preacher arguing that no law can justify a thing which is wrong in itself. Drinking was condemned as the wrong wrong and the traffic a gigantic evil to be discouraged and condemned in every way. The liquor question, he said, had become one which our politicians were compelled to discuss and it was discussed 'in the parliamentary world and the very best of them are continually debating it.' Mr. Crisp said he was informed that there were thirteen places in Chatham, between Miramichi and the Canada House, where liquor was sold before the Scott Act was in force, and he seemed to believe what he said, and also to think there were less now. He commended Ingersoll's views of the temperance question, and said those who were the best friends of temperance got the worst name. Politicians profess temperance with a view of helping them to be elected, but he warned the electors to vote only for men who were sound on the prohibition question.

A Praiseworthy Step. A number of citizens were called together in the office of John Sadler, Esq., on Tuesday afternoon for the purpose of offering aid to the good sisters of the Hotel Dieu, whose Hospital wards are filled with typhoid fever patients. The meeting organized by appointing Mr. J. L. Stewart, Chairman and Mr. K. B. Adams, Secretary.

The following preamble and resolutions were moved by L. J. Tweedie, Esq., and seconded by Mr. J. D. B. MacKenzie, and adopted. Whereas Typhoid fever is almost epidemic in Chatham and the Hotel Dieu is taxed to its utmost in providing for the large number of patients now in the wards of that institution, and whereas the resources of the Hotel Dieu are limited and the good sisters must find themselves handicapped in their good and charitable work of attending the wants of the sick and preventing the spread of the disease by throwing open the doors of their institution to all classes of persons afflicted with it.

Resolved that a committee be appointed to receive subscriptions on behalf of the good sisters of the Hotel Dieu from all persons who may desire to subscribe to the fund to be raised for that purpose, and that a subscription list for that purpose be opened by each of the members of the committee hereafter named.

The following gentlemen were then elected a committee to receive subscriptions:— J. Snowball, F. E. Winslow, John Sadler, H. S. Miller (of the N. B. Trading Co.), A. Anderson, J. D. B. MacKenzie, R. A. Lawlor, Roger Flanagan, K. B. Adams and E. Hutchison.

Mr. J. D. B. MacKenzie was appointed Treasurer of the fund and has already sent \$50 to Mother Renaud. We hope that our citizens generally will take advantage of the opportunity now presented of doing something to show their appreciation of the work done by the Hotel Dieu, not only in the present emergency, but for many years past. The public here very little of the self-denying and charitable labors of Mother Renaud and her devoted staff, for they never seek publicity, seeming to find their reward in benefiting their fellow-creatures—protestant and catholic alike. Presbyterian Synod. The Synod of the maritime provinces, in connection with the Presbyterian church in Canada, met at Pictou, N. S. last Thursday. In the absence of Rev. J. M. McLeod the retiring moderator, who has recently gone to British Columbia, Mr. J. D. B. MacKenzie, ex-moderator, opened the synod by conducting public worship and preaching from the closing words of 1st Timothy, 3:15.

Rev. Dr. Blair, seconded by Rev. W. S. McKenzie, moved Rev. Isaac Murray. Rev. Dr. Blair, seconded by Rev. W. S. McKenzie, moved Rev. Isaac Murray. The vote being taken Rev.
