Miramichi-Bound Vessel Sunk.

The barque Petitcodiac, of Moncton, arrived at Campbellton on Monday last with the master and eleven men of the ship Minnie Swift of Maitland, together with nine men belonging to the barque Zullette, of North Shields, and six cattle men, of the steamer Geographique; four passenger of the Minnie Swift, were drowned in collision with the steamer and one man is missing. The captain, two boys and two men of the Zullette were drowned and one man is missing.

The "Minnie Swift" was bound from Greenock to Miramichi. Oply a few days out she rescued 12 men from the barque "Zullette," the captain and three of which vessel were washed overboard and drowned. Resuming her voyage the "Minnie Swift" was ruu down, on October 3rd, some 45 miles from St. Pierre, by the French Steamer "Geographique" Montreal and lady passenger of the "Swift", named Masters, the steward and stewardess five of the "Swifts" crew and two of the men saved from the "Zulette" were missing after the collision, the rest being saved by clambering on board the Steamer. Those on board of the latter made no effort to save their missing ones, pleading it was too dark. 
