called upon to do so by an Inspecting Officer
2. Every Trader, Manufacturer and owner of Weights, Measures and Weighing Machines when paying moneys to Inspectors or Assistant Iuspectors of Weights and Measures for verifica-tion fees, is entitled to, and is especially requested to demand from the officer who makes the in spection an official certificate ("Form O 6" with the words "Original for the Trader," printed at th head thereof) properly filled out and stamped and also at same time to carefully ascertain whether or not the stamps attached to such certificate represent exactly in value the amount of cash paid. Traders are requested to bear in mind that certificates of verification are of no value whatever unless stamps covering the full amount of fees charged are attached. 3. Owners or holders of these official certificates

are especially requested to keep them carefully for two years, and in order to secure their saf keeping it would be advisable to placard them in their places of business in the manner in which ordinary License certificates are done; for i who are unable to produce their properly stamped certificates, when asked to do so by an Inspector or Assistant Inspector, may, in all probability have to pay over again their verification fees.


