May he again ask for a similars place. You were kind enough to criticise the above and although your remarks were very plausible, in the main, they were not at all convincing to me. The question was asked, what became of the puny salmon that were thrown into the streams but, of course, you did not answer because you did not know. I might also have asked what became of the parent fish The fires in Hardwicke were raging after the unnatural process they go through. Report says that few if any survive the operation. Now sir, when we consider that some 500 or 600 salmon, or more, are taken yearly when they are making their way up to their spawning grounds, and that the Government net turns back perhaps thousands to be caught by the poacher's net, how is it possible but that the salmon will soon be destroy ed? You admit that if the same amount of money were spent in the protection of the fisheries that it costs to run the slaughter-house, that the country would be largely the gainer.

With reference to the bass it is evident the cause of its decline is : 1st. Bag nets 2nd. Shanties on the ice; 3rd. Small meshed scoop nets &c. It is possible that all this has been remedied. for the rascally and dishonest management of that period has been changed. In our opinion, the method of disposing of the fry is still altogether wrong and irrational. Considering the condition of the N. W. Salmon fisheries the benefits of the hatchery seem very doubtful.]


