

FARM AND GARDEN. INSTRUCTIVE INFORMATION RELAT-

ING TO THE FARM.

Remove the Suckers Which Spring Up from the Base of the Trees and Draw on Their Strength and Vigor-How and When to Do This.

Among other industries of neglected orchards are the suckers which are allowed to spring up from the base of the stems. When the trees are young, and these suckers are only a year old or less, they may be pulled up without much labor and the trees preserved in a neat and thrifty appearance (Fig. 1.) But if neglected they will become large and thick and are difficult to remove, and they draw largely on the strength and vigor of the trees. (See Fig. 2).

THRIFTY TREE-RUINED BY SUCKERS. The owners then attempt to get rid of them, but they are too strong to be pulled, and as a resort they are cut away with knife or ax once, leaving the stubs. These send up more new suckers and the condition of the tree is worse than before. Timely removal of these sprouts is easily performed, and a neat and handsome symmetrical shape is preserved. pools in or on it. Most persons do not fully appreciate the importance of cultivation as a means of supplying moisture. As rains are periodical, and as at certain seasons long periods of dry weather intervene, the moisture must be furnished through the medium of cultivation. The earth is the great storehouse of moisture from which all living plants draw their supply. The water in the earth is either going downward from an excess poured on the surface by rains or being drawn upward by capillary attraction when the surface has become hard and dry. Hence the importance of breaking this dry crust, or rather not permitting it to form, by frequent cultivation or such a stirring of the soil as breaks up the capillary connection, arrests the ascending moisture and holds it within reach of the roots of the plants in a mulch of loose soil instead of allowing it to reach the surface and be wasted in evapora-

The Weevil in Peas and Beans. Seed peas and beans can be rid of weevil larvæ in several ways. One and the simplest way is to plunge them for a few moments in boiling water. Another and a very good and effective one is what is called the bi-sulphide of carbon treatment. The seed is put in a tight box or barrel, a small vessel containing half a gill of bi-sulphide of carbon placed upon the seed and the receptacle kept tightly closed for at least forty-eight hours. The drug will then have evaporated and permeated all through the seed so that every weevil is killed. Don't overlook that the vapor is extremely inflammable. The operation should be carried on outdoors or in an open shed, and the seed when emptied out kept away from light or fire.

OF INTEREST TO CHEESE MAKERS.

Rules Laid Down by Professor Robertson for Guidance. Thorough distribution of the rennet in the milk must be effected by diluting the rennet extract and by vigorous stirring. Sufficient rennet to coagulate the curd into a state fit for cutting in from thirty to forty minutes at from 86 to 90 degs. should be used. When an extra quantity of rennet is used, a corresponding increase in the weight of salt should be added to the curd.

The contents of the vat should be perfectly still when coagulation commences Vibration of the floor and of the vat during the thickening of the milk causes waste. The horizontal knife should be used first in the cutting, and active stirring should not commence until the cubes of curd become slightly healed. The temperature should be raised gradually to 96 or 98 degs. Fahr. The stirring should be continued until the curd particles are so well "cooked" or "dried" that when a handful has been pressed for a few moments they will fall apart again as the result of any slight disturb-

As soon as the presence of acid is discernible by the hot iron test the whey should be removed. In the case of gassy curds, a further development of acid before the drawing of the whey will be Hand stirring will be of advantage un-


