



On or as soon as possible after the streams of the gulf and lower St. Lawrence first day of June in each year, the revising district and the trout lakes and rivers of officer shall cause the list of voters to be compared with the last assessment rolls, and with all the information that he can | are alike being daily whipped by scores of btain from that source, and from provincia!, municipal and other official lists, re cords, and proceedings, and by means o solemn declarations made as hereinafter provided according to the statute relating to extra judicial oaths, shall proceed to revise each list of voters then in force under this act for the electoral district or portion of an electoral district for which he is appointed, and shall prepare two separate lists in like form as the original list, one entitled, 'Names to be added and corrections to be made,' and the other Names to be removed.

From this it will be noted that all voters now living and residing within the province, who were on the lists prepared in 1886, are to be retained on the lists now being made up. The revising officers are to examine the assessment rol's and place the water of the Restigouche River. The on the list all not now on, which appear to be entitled to go on.

The act also provides that the revising officer shall seek information from "pro vincial, municipal and other official lists" in making up his lists. But it must be kept in mind that the revising officers will not take all the names on the revised list of electors for the provincial legislature now made up in each constituency, inasmuch as there is a personal property qualification for the provincial lists, while ther is none for the dominion lists.

Under these circumstances it is neces sary that in every polling section through out the province active steps he taken to have applications sent in to the revising officer under solemn declaration, made before a justice of the peace, to have all names added to the list which are not on the assessment rolls of 1888-89, for the necessary property qualification,

These declarations must be made in th form prescribed by the act, and state the qualification on which the voter claims to be put on the list. For instance, as "farmer's son," "occupants of property," 'tenants," "income" and "annuitants."

These blank forms of application are o be printed, and will no doubt be ob tainable by persons in all parts of the

It must be borne in mind that it is no necessary that the party applying shall make the "declaration" or affidavit.
