Distribution of Young Salmon.

MIRAMICHI HATCHERY, June 14 th, 1889. The work of distributing the Salmon fry from the Miramichi Salmon Hatchery was completed on the 13th inst. The number of fry turned out this season was not as great as the output for the past two or three years on account of the high water which prevailed last Autumn and prevented the fishermen from securing as many parent fish as was desired.

There were 830,000 ova placed in the Hatching Troughs from which were successfully hatched and distributed 800,000 fry. In addition to this number 50,000 "Eyed Eggs" were received from the Restigouche Nursury which have also been successfully hatched and planted in the Headwaters of the North West Mira-The different Streams and the number of fry planted in each are as follows :
